H. Ricardo Ramirezis the Director of Music and Orgist for the Cathedral of the Holy Name, Chicago Illinois where he directs four choral ensembles and performs on the cathedral three mechanical instruments cluding the West Gallery 117-rank organ built by Flentrop Orgelbouw. Born in the Pass, Texas, Dr. Ramirez attended the University of Notre Dame earning two underaduate degrees simultaneously: B.S. in electrical engineering, and, B.M. in perfoance. He later received a Master of Music degree from Southern Methodist University in allas, Texas, and he earned the Doctor of Musical Arts Degree from the Eastman School of Music, Rochester, New York. His teachers included Daniel H. Pedtke, Susaeid Martin, Robert Anderson, and, David Craighead (organ). Other teachers included Pfautch (choral conducting), Gerald Plain (composition) and William

King) and Elizabeth Clark, as well as further studies in rigginal dance with Bill Crasse (Iroquois song leader). Dr. Ramirez provided the chreography for the operaKillbear Comes Honbay composer Paul Stuart which was hailed as "a charming, visceral community of Native American and moderdance" (Democrat and Chronicle).

Among Dr. Ramirez specializations ingram repertoire is French organ music of the twentieth century, including the complete organ works of Maurice Duruflé and theix symphonies for organ of Louis Vierne. The Flint Journal's review of his performance of Louis Viern's Symphony was impressive and exciting...(and)...the improvised set of variations on end Creator hould be written down as a model for improvisation." Dr. Ramirez has been awarded prizes in organ playing and comption including National hymn Competition sponsored by the Diocese of Rochester, New York; the Flint, Main International Organ-Palying Competition, and the Fort Wayne, Indiana National Organ Playing Competition.
